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




Another tragic story from the history of Antarctic exploration is that of the Terra Nova expedition, led by Robert Falcon Scott. On their return journey, Scott and his companions perished in a blizzard just eleven miles from safety. Their bodies were found frozen in their tent eight months later.



The dangers of Antarctic exploration are not limited to the past. In 1996, eight members of a Russian research team were killed when an ice floe collapsed beneath their feet. And in 2008, a British explorer named Henry Worsley died while attempting to cross the Antarctic continent alone.

The icy graves of those who have perished in the Antarctic serve as a reminder of the unforgiving nature of this unforgiving continent.




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
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
