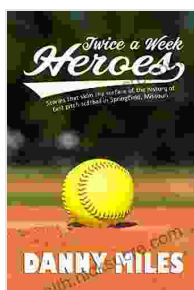


Twice-Week Heroes: The Extraordinary Journey of Frank Christianson

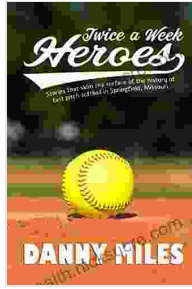

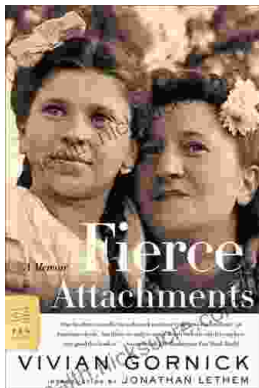
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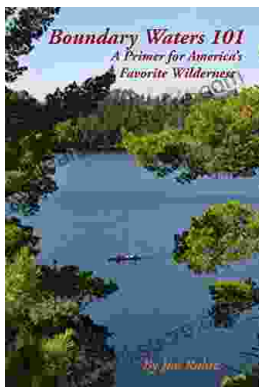


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
